40 years seems to be the defining moment for ex-Welhamites.



THE WE-CARE INITITATIVE

The WE-CARE initiative was started four years ago by a group of us from within the Alumni Association, whereby we worked out a complete scheme for ex-teachers and ex-class IV employees. The scheme essentially benefits those who really need our help.

All these years one has been hearing that the pensions for the ex-staff is very meager but it was a greater shock to actually see the numbers on paper. Teachers who taught generations of us and have given 25 years of unstinting service to School, get as little as Rs. 800. Ayahjis & Bearerjis with over 20 years of service get between Rs.175 & Rs.500.

Sponsor one teacher for a year (Rs. 36,000)

Sponsor one staff member for a year (Rs. 12,000)

Make a contribution of ANY sum that you are comfortable with

The above can be done by you individually, as a group or as a batch.

I would like to specify that though we will be acknowledging the contributions wherever possible, they will be acknowledged as contributions to WE-CARE and not to the individual teachers/staff member by name, since this is a matter of great sensitivity and has to be done with discretion so as not to affect the dignity of the teachers in the slightest way.

We have had some very generous donations to our We-Care initiative in the past and are currently sending a supplementary pension amount to four teachers, to be continued through their life-time. We are also sponsoring the education of one girl child from Uttaranchal at 'Himjyoti', a residential school meant for girls from low-income families (under Rs 5000/- per month). The contribution is Rs. 50,000/- a year for education plus complete living expenses.

Today we are reaching to the whole Welham family. Let's all join hands and help all we can in this hour of need and show that that we really do care!

A WE CARE SUCCESS STORY

"Ranjeet Singh bearer has been working at Welhams for the past 35 years. During my visit to School for the Music and Dance comp last month, Mrs. Dutta and Mr. Vacchani asked me to help out his son who required a bilateral hip replacement surgery. Sandeep, the 18-year-old son developed a debilitating disease - Ankylosing Spondylitis, 2 years back. The disease has destroyed both hip joints, and left the child immobile. He has to be carried in a stretcher all the time. This surgery would change his life and allow him to walk and live a decent life. He would require life-long physiotherapy and medications, but would at least be able to live a life of dignity..."

This letter was received by We Care last year from a concerned ex-Welhamite, Shruti Lakhanpal, which we floated over emails to several exies. Today, with assistance from Welhamites across the globe and timely medical aid from Fortis Hospital, the youngster is walking again. Please see the newspaper article overleaf...




THE POWER OF I PLEDGE
